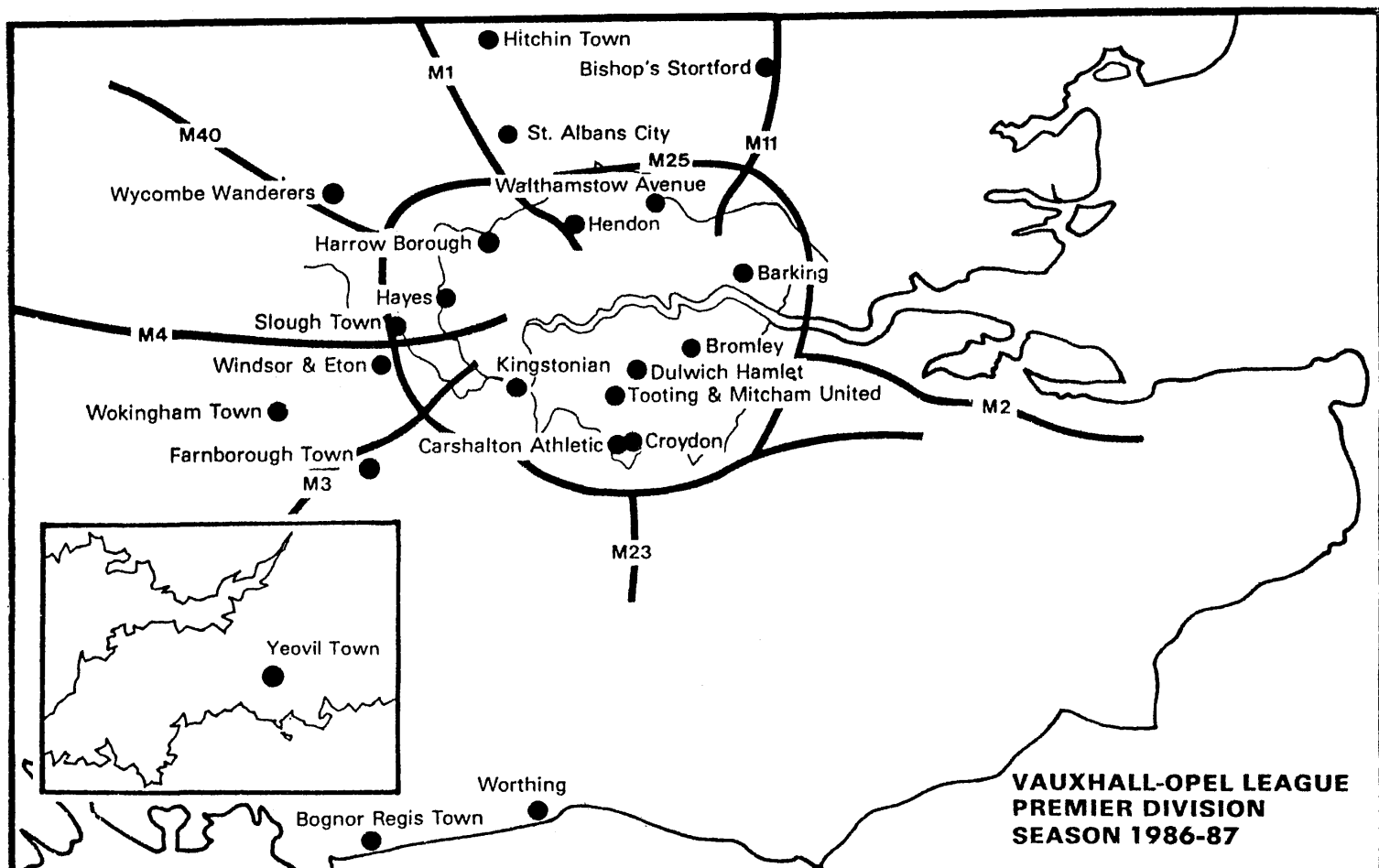

FROM THE TERRACES by Simon Burrage.

As far as our league form is concerned October was a month in which what almost became an alarming slump was halted in convincing fashion, and consequently we are again on top of the league and 'looking good'.

To begin with, Bishop's Stortford came to Loakes Park and deprived us of 2 points, though if the Blues had played for the whole 90 minutes as they eventually did in the last 15 they would have done nothing of the sort. It was sheer lethargy for the first $\frac{3}{4}$ of the game, but once the clock began to move ominously towards full-time things started to happen. Westies' spectacular shot against the upright would have been a superb goal and in the dying moments the ball flew wide, apparently off Dave Burgess' shin, when it seemed any touch would send the ball into the net.

Then arrived the new messiah, Barry Silkman. Regrettably, only a temporary saviour, but I have heard it said that one of the reasons Barry has had "more clubs than Jack Nicklaus" is that he loses interest after a few matches. Whether or not that is fair judgement I don't know, but in any case it is great to see such a quality player performing in a Wycombe shirt, however briefly his stay may be. Alan Gane was very careful not to let us build up hopes of him staying at Wycombe (when you hear that Maidstone United, amongst others, are interested in signing him you know that a lot of would have been on offer.) and the Boss deserves a lot of credit for acquiring his services. On Harrow Borough's excellent, well-lit surface he certainly did look a "class above the rest" but unfortunately his presence was not enough to prevent our third defeat in four games. Trevor How & Co. took great delight in giving us a frustrating time up front, though once we had snatched an equaliser after the break it looked to be simply a matter of time before we would get the winner (and hear another goal unannounced over their tannoy). Our domination was abruptly ended when Gary Lester rather rashly bolted from his goalline to confront Lawrence Holmes and unfortunately only succeeded in making it relatively easy for the Harrow forward to score with a lob. It was Gary's 400th appearance for Wycombe as well. Still, he wasn't the only Wycombe player to slip-up at the back, by any means (*Blue* wasn't my favourite colour that night, though admittedly any full-back would have his hands full with Mark Adams; and what a difference a *Day* didn't make for their first goal).

So there was more than a little pressure building up when we visited that lovely stadium called Wexham Park. We had taken 1 point from the previous 12 (having started the season with 24 out of 24) and 4th placed Slough were in tremendous form. It had all the makings of one of those painful local derby memories, but as one of the Slough newspapers commented a week later, someone gave Wycombe the wrong script. A lovely 3-0 win silenced the few hundred Slough fans in the 1400 crowd and gave us a very pleasant afternoon. It was nice for 'Elvis' to leave on a high note, too. Excellent though the result was, I still didn't think the overall performance was as good as I believe we are capable of producing (if we ever get a completely fit squad again, someone is going to get a hiding). The goals were strangely scrappy affairs (not that we cared) and

the game had gone to sleep slightly as a goal-less half-time score approached. Then quite suddenly we were celebrating a 2-0 lead - well those of us who were not eating dust, after feeling the force of a Slough supporter's right hook, were celebrating anyway. As a result, "we can see you sneaking out" may not be sung again with such gay abandon.

I think it's time to mention the Capital League..."The Capital League". No, seriously, personally I thought the Capital League was a bit of a nuisance to us at times last season - public interest in the matches was very limited. However, so far the two games this season have been quite different - the 3-2 win over Orient was quite jolly, and the 5-4 win over Wimbledon was very jolly indeed. With 'The Dons' now being a 1st Division outfit, a crowd of close to 400 turned out - not an enormous figure perhaps but not far short of some GMVC attendances. Some seemed to be under the impression that they were seeing Wimbledon's full First Team (and ours!) and that the Capital League Cup was an important competition to us (perhaps it is now!), because a lot of people were quite ecstatic when the final whistle went and Wycombe had won. Mind you, the football had been so entertaining that we would probably have applauded even if the ninth goal had gone the other way. The appearance of Gerry Francis was an unexpected bonus, but it was rather unkindly suggested that the side Wimbledon had put out bore little resemblance to their 1st Division team as they were actually passing the ball around and playing neat, attractive football (!)

Back to the VOL, and a visit from Tooting who were proudly proclaiming the Premier Division's best defensive record. A 1200 plus crowd, Frank Sidebottom records over the tannoy (?), Barry Silkman's first crowd pleasing appearance at Loakes Park, a 4-0 win, including two superb goals from Connolly and Graham, 3 points in the bag and a 2 point lead at the top of the table. It wasn't a bad day! On the subject of attendances - 1200 for an Isthmian League game with Tooting, our third crowd of a thousand in our last four home league fixtures - do we really envy old rivals like Wealdstone and Dagenham, miserably struggling in the GMVC in front of gates of 4 to 500? Of course we do want to get back there with them, but we're not having such a bad time down here at the moment. Ironically, if (when?) we do get back, our gates would probably decline again. It would appear that the public prefer watching a winning team at a lower level than hard competition with stronger opposition. (We'll just have to win the GMVC I suppose).

Ah, the magic of the F A Cup. Well it's something like that. How could a team with a name like "Valley Sports Rugby" do that to us on our own ground? Someone ought to have told them "Look here you Southern League Midlanders, we're Wycombe Wanderers, we're allowed through to the 1st Round Proper, OK." Still, I suppose we're bound to get thrashed if our forwards apparently decide to have a private competition with our defenders, to see whether the front men can miss chances more frequently than the back four can present them to the opposition (especially when there is an opposing forward with the searing pace and control of Rugby's Steve Norris). All in all, it added up to one massive disaster. It's bad enough that the place 'invented' that nasty game with oval balls, but this?!

DO THEY MEAN US? **investigated by Steve Maguire**

It was hardly worth travelling by train to Walthamstow via Croydon and Kingston in search of reports from the opposition's local press, although there have been a couple of quotes from rival managers worth repeating. Chris Kelly the Kingstonian manager, never short of things to say during his playing days, said in the Kingstonian programme *"I have no doubt that, come the end of the season, Wycombe will certainly finish in the top three."* While Jack Pearce of Bognor said that Bognor *"did enough to earn a draw at Wycombe"* and added *"Even though Wycombe are a hard side to beat, we had more than 70% of the play without creating many chances"*.

The **"WONDERFUL WYCOMBE"** headline from the Bromley game has already been mentioned in 'Chairboys Gas', but this is no reason why it shouldn't be repeated as most Wycombe supporters don't normally buy the Bromley Advertiser. Their report started by saying *"It is going to take a very good team to stop Wycombe from winning the Vauxhall-Opel League Premier Division title"*, and continued to sing our praises throughout the report of our comprehensive 4-0 win at Hayes Lane. Lovely stuff.

The Western Gazette, the main newspaper that covers Yeovil's matches gave only a brief report of our game at Huish, but they did also include some other items relevant to the game. Yeovil manager Gerry Gow was quoted as saying about Wycombe *"They are a very strong side and will undoubtedly be in the running at the end of the season. I cannot see many sides beating the Wanderers"*. (Let's hope that he is right).

The Western Gazette also published a letter from a neutral spectator at the game, a Windsor supporter who was not too happy with some of the things going on, off the pitch. *"From the kick-off we were to endure an incessant barrage of obscene chanting from hundreds of young and not-so-young Yeovil 'supporters'... I found it astonishing that there was no attempt by officials or managerial staff to discourage the vile abuse directed at the referee, linesman, players and visitors from Wycombe"*. The writer, a Mr Endacott, was also rather critical of the police's handling of the incident between rival 'fans', and said *"I left the ground before the end, sickened and saddened"*. It is rather suprising that Mr Endacott did not condemn the section of the Wycombe crowd who proved to most people in the ground that they can swear just as loud and as often as the locals.

The subject of crowds also came up in the various reports of our superb result at Wexham Park. In the Midweek I was suprised to read in Rolf Niven's report that *"Slough, despite the help of 1,435 supporters..."*. Surely a slip of the pen here or maybe he didn't look too closely at the crowd - at least half of them must have been Wycombe supporters. The average attendance at Loakes Park this season is over 900, double the Wexham Park average, and I'm sure that leaving the ground at the end of the game I saw more beaming Wycombe faces than sad, sad Slough ones!

Dave Tossell in the Slough Observer also made a strange comment when describing events after our third goal. *"with even White losing interest the Rebels fans were left to content themselves by taking the rise out of Lester in the Wycombe goal"*. Well if by 'taking the rise' he means a constant stream of abuse with every other word beginning with 'f', they certainly had a good time, just as they did at the start of the game when they cheered when Neil Price went down injured. Could someone please explain to me, maybe one of our own supporters, what enjoyment you can possibly get out of seeing a player getting injured?

League News

The race for a place in the GMVC is on, with any of the top seven clubs in the Premier Division capable of contending the single promotion place. Some consolation for Wycombe is that three of these clubs are still in the F A Cup, which will hopefully prove them costly as the season progresses.

BOGNOR REGIS TOWN have lost just one game this season and that was at Loakes Park in August. Jack Pearce, manager of Bognor, has recently signed ex-Wanderer Joe Blochel who has just returned from playing in Sweden.

Another team with only one league defeat this season are YEOVIL TOWN. They lost their unbeaten run in their 12th game of the season when FARNBOROUGH TOWN triumphed 2-1 at Huish in front of a gate of 2,352. Farnborough had lost the previous Saturday, 5-1, at Barking in a performance described by Farnborough manager Ted Pearce as "Spineless". Following the revival at Yeovil, Boro' suprisingly drew at home to Dulwich and lost a week later at Carshalton. The loss of league form at Farnborough may stem from the loss of full-back Mark Turkington. Ted Pearce originally released full-back Richard Walden to Basingstoke after Turkington had taken his place. Now Turkington has gone to Portsmouth on a three week trial after being watched by Alan Ball, the Pompey manager.

BARKING, who have returned some erratic results this season, have signed Tommy Horan from Dagenham and 'keeper Gary Harrold from Billericay to ease their injury problems. At one time manager Bobby Archer had eight on the injured list and had to play himself in the 2-0 defeat at Bognor in the GMAC. The worst hit was striker Terry Rogers who had 40 stitches in a leg wound received in a car accident. He returned against Yeovil and soon showed his form by scoring in the 1-1 draw. Prior to his injury he had netted six goals in eight games and Southend, Orient and Queens Park Rangers had shown interest.

Following weeks of speculation, Mark Adams has moved from HARROW BOROUGH to Brighton for a four figure fee. Boro' manager, Keith Chamberlain signed Adams last January from Hendon for only £300. Besides paying an undisclosed fee, Brighton will also be bringing their full first team squad to Earlsmead for a friendly in the next eight weeks. Adams played previously at Wealdstone and Hayes before joining Hendon. Still at Harrow, Boro' have signed ex-Wycombe 'keeper Stuart Walton. Walton played for 'The Blues' in the Capital League last season and was due to make his Boro' debut against Hitchin Town as regular 'keeper Kenny Lavender was injured.

SEASON BY SEASON

1966-7

SUMMARY by Steve Maguire.

The 1966/67 season will probably be best remembered by Wycombe supporters for the performances of Tony 'Bodger' Horseman, who scored a phenomenal 76 goals during the season out of a Club total of 188.

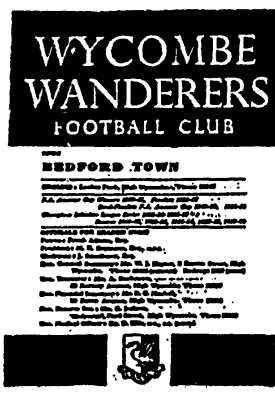
Tony started the season in typical fashion with a hat-trick against Clapton while another player in good form from the start of the season was 'keeper John Maskell, who was particularly outstanding in the games against league pacesetters Hendon and Enfield (against whom he saved a penalty). During the season Tony and John (twice) both represented the Isthmian League and along with Barry Baker, all played in the Amateur International Trial game for The South versus The North at Loakes Park in October. 'Bodger' in fact was chosen as captain of the South's team, but it was rather surprising to many people that neither he or John could manage to break into the full England side.

During the early part of the season two attractive friendlies were staged against foreign opposition and another highlight was reached when in the game at St Albans, Paul Bates played his 450th game for the Club.

In the F A Cup, a home draw with Athenian League side, Cheshunt provided no obstacle and we progressed into the First Round Proper, which turned into a 6½ hour marathon with Southern League side, Bedford Town. After a 1-1 draw here before 7,488 we were held again in the replay at The Eyrie, this time in front of a gate of 7,641, but only after a hotly disputed penalty just minutes from time gave Bedford another chance. The third game, back at Loakes Park, attracted 8,821 and was played under terrible conditions with continuous heavy rain. The referee was forced to abandon the game before extra-time could start as the rain and mud had obliterated most of the touchlines. Bedford eventually squeezed home by the odd goal in another exciting match at Bedford in front of 8,105.

The national press gave extensive coverage to the Bedford saga but a few weeks later Wycombe were again featured in the national press over a threatened strike by the first team squad. A difference of opinion with the Club's selection committee had prompted manager, Barry Darvill to resign with most of the senior players ready to walk out in support. Thankfully a compromise was reached and Barry was persuaded to stay.

1966/67 was also the season that substitutes were first allowed in English football, but 'The Blues' failed to provide a substitute for the Amateur Cup game at Leytonstone and an injury hit side went out at the first attempt. In the league we were well up with the leaders for most of the season and did top the table a few weeks before Christmas. However, our hopes finally collapsed after a crushing defeat at the hands of Wealdstone. In the County Cup we lost out in the Final at Maidenhead after extra-time, but we did manage to win the Wycombe Floodlight League, The A F A Invitation Cup and The Marlow Invitation Cup.

CONFERENCE lost at London Road for 20 years and maintained their remarkable record with a 2-0 victory before a midweek gate of 1,915. Enfield's away form this season is second to none having won seven of their eight away games. Their only away loss came at Boston in September where they lost 5-1 before a 1,302 attendance at York Street.

On the subject of attendances, no less than 40% of all Conference gates have attracted crowds in excess of 1,000, and at present eight clubs are enjoying four figure average home gates - Barnet, Telford, Altrincham, Boston, Stafford, Maidstone, Kidderminster and Cheltenham.

Kim Casey continues to score goals for KIDDERMINSTER HARRIERS. Casey recently scored his 22nd league and cup goal of the season and has been attracting the attention of Aston Villa, Spurs, Manchester City and Fulham. Offers have been in the region of £50,000 but Harriers manager Graham Allner said "Kim scored 73 goals in 68 matches last season and he is obviously more valuable to the club than any transfer fee". Casey, an Insurance Underwriter, added "Playing for Harriers not only makes financial sense but I find the blend of work and football refreshing."

Ex-Isthmians SUTTON UNITED, recently had Larry Pritchard resign as First Team Manager. He had been at Sutton for 21 years in two spells broken by a four season stay at Loakes Park. Larry played over 1,000 times for Sutton and Wycombe.

Sutton have not been enjoying such large crowds as most Conference sides (average approx 700) but they recently won the GM Vauxhall Monthly Goals Jackpot for October. United, who set a new league record with their 8-0 victory over Kettering during October, scored a total of 16 goals during the month and have earned £1,000 for their achievement. Paul McKinnon has scored seven goals in his first four matches since returning from playing in Sweden.

Following the 8-0 reverse at Sutton, KETTERING TOWN manager Dave Needham resigned. The former Nottingham Forest centre-half became the second Conference manager to part company with their club in a week. Terry Hibbit became the first loss of the season when he resigned from the managerial post at GATESHEAD. Coach George Smith has taken as manager at Gateshead while Arthur Mann and Billy Jeffrey are acting as joint caretaker managers at Rockingham Road.

IN GOAL FOR WYCOMBE... by Pete Oxbrow

Throughout my time as a Blues follower, Wycombe have had just two regular goalkeepers - John Maskell and Gary Lester. How many other clubs can boast such a record in that period? Perhaps this is one of the reasons for our consistent success during this time? Supporters will, of course, always argue over which player was superior. I personally rate John Maskell as slightly the better 'keeper but Gary still has a good few years in hand (we hope).

John only came to Wycombe in the early 1960's because of an injury crisis at Loakes Park but by the time I first started watching 'The Blues' he was a regular and firm favourite. Only the excellent John Swannell of Hendon and an apparent difficulty in getting time off work surely prevented 'Mask' from holding down the England Amateur slot. Maskell did have his darker side though, occasionally his temper got the better of him, especially if he was given some 'stick' by an opposing forward. He was once sent-off in a match at Woking for throwing a punch! But to my mind, his finest hour came on a January night in 1975 at Ayresome Park where he was only beaten after 89 minutes to fully earn the applause of the 30,000 plus gate along with ten other heroes in blue.

There have been other 'keepers here of course - some who came to play in goal and some who didn't. In the first category I remember Colin Bunting (father of Trevor) who was reserve 'keeper in the 1960's. Unfortunately my only memory is that of Colin letting in 9 goals (4 disallowed) against Slough in a Wycombe Floodlight Cup match (sorry Colin). Kevin O'Brien was a reliable and loyal deputy during the early 1970's. In the days of squad football at Loakes Park, Kevin was normally restricted to Premier Midweek League games, friendlies and games against Corinthian Casuals (when he didn't have much to do anyway!). In the second category I remember Bernie Bremer, Dave Bullock and Bob Davies. Bernie was a popular midfield player for us in the early 1970's who specialised in goals from 25 yards (and more!). However, one Tuesday night at Hendon he was forced to take over in goal in the 2nd minute from an injured John Maskell and stopped almost everything that was thrown at him - one shot even knocked him out when he decided to stop it with his face! That night Wycombe played like world beaters, winning 3-1, with Bernie being carried off by Blues fans at the end, covered in scarves!

Dave Bullock was a utility player we signed from Hayes. However, we didn't think that utility meant playing in goal. The first time was a league match against Enfield. We arrived at the ground to hear the shattering announcement over the loudspeaker of "In goal for Wycombe, Dave Bullock..." The announcer explained that Maskell was injured and the reserve 'keeper was otherwise indisposed. We all wished we were playing Clapton or Casuals, when in the first minute, poor Dave tried to dribble the ball in the box only to lose it to an Enfield player who promptly scored. Somehow, though, we won 2-1 and Dave went on to play several more games in goal most of which we won.

Bob Davies, a good defender who played in our back four in the late 1970's, was forced to go 'between the sticks' in a game at Staines as both our regular keepers were injured. We lost 2-1 and in the 'Bucks Free Press' the comment was made that as both our Manager (Andy Williams) and Assistant (Howard Wells) were ex-keepers, why weren't they registered as players in case of emergency? (I wonder if Richard Teale is registered?).
