Bressington, sent off in last Saturday's match against Boston Utd, was due to have secret talks with Barnet manager Barry Fry this week, who is thought to be interested in signing the fans' favourite. Sources say Bressington is unhappy with chairman Brian Lee and is looking for a move from Lookers Park.

Barnet's Steve Cox and Ian Fergusson have joined Wycombe Wanderers on loan, after manager Barry Fry rejected a £12,000 bid for the pair. But Fry won't be signing Wycombe's Graham Bressington, who has moved to Lincoln City.

"Yep. I've heard the one about the popular, successful manager being given the boot just before the season begins, I've heard about the star England International leaving, I've heard about the local hero midfield dynamo leaving, the possible signings who weren't in the least bit interested in coming to Wycombe, the massive defeats..."

"Give it a rest will you, you're supposed to be talking me out of throwing myself over the edge...not listing the reasons for doing it!"

"Sorry. By the way, what's all that noise I can hear? Is there someone else up there with you?"

"Someone? There's 1,100 of us up here actually."

"Christ. That could make quite a mess on the pavement...anyway listen, don't do anything silly will you, think about the positive points. You've still got..well, you can always...er...well...yes, you're still in the F A Trophy and the Berks and Bucks aren't you?"

"Huh. We'll probably be out of the Trophy before Christmas."

"Yeah, and my team will probably do you again in the Berks and Bucks!"

"Your team? Who do you support then?"

"Aylesbury"

"Hello are you still there? Hello? Hello?"

Wycombe supporters will need no reminding that there has been two main features distinguishing the Club's season so far (so why is he reminding us - Sarcastic Ed); one being the lack of success on the field, the other being the tremendous support from the terraces. Much has already been said and written about the former of these two issues, so let's dwell on the latter for a while. Home attendances this season have been quite astonishing. They simply do not bear any comparison with those of recent years. Now I'm not a statistics person - no-one could compete with Steve "ask me how many corners-kicks we had in that match" Maguire - but even I can remember that during our last Conference/Gola season gates at Loakes Park were usually well below the 1,000 mark. When the figures went over the thousand last season, I put it down to the fact that we were winning, winning, winning. I suspect I was not alone in expecting that crowds might actually drop this season in the Conference, because people - or so I thought - simply like to watch a winning team. What makes this season's

figures even more remarkable is that as things have become more and more desperate on the playing side, the turnstiles have actually clicked faster and faster. Take the recent matches with Sutton and Dagenham, for example. Both were Conference fixtures, both on Tuesday evenings, in similar weather conditions, with seven days between the two. Versus Sutton - who had hit the headlines three days earlier with an F A Cup win over Football League opposition, and probably brought close to 100 supporters with them - the attendance was 1,217. One week later, we played Dagenham - surely one of the least attractive sides in the GMVC along with ourselves, Bath, Wealdstone and Northwich. Dagenham brought absolutely no support whatsoever; I made a point of watching (and listening) when they scored their goal - ONE person clapped behind their goal, and there was complete silence from the stand. But the attendance was 1,225, which effectively means quite a few more home supporters were present than had been the previous week, with just a 4-2 defeat at Altrincham between the home games. As Andy said over the Tannoy, "God knows what gates we would get if we actually started winning". After the (shambolic) victory over Dagenham, will police be required to set a limit on the crowd for the Boston match?! I suppose it should be said that the attendance 'boom' is largely due to a nationwide increase in interest in the GMVC, but we are clearly the only club in the bottom group to have benefited to this extent.

It's the away support that's been particularly impressive recently, though. At Altrincham the support was loud and feverishly enthusiastic from the kick-off to the final whistle. If anyone reading this is a 'home only' fan, let me tell you that you are missing out on a lot. The efforts of the players and supporters at Altrincham would have left you "proud to be a Chairboy". Having taken an early lead and then fallen behind before half-time, the contingent behind the goal roared endless encouragement as the Wanderers strove to equalise. When Phil Lovell eventually headed that richly deserved equaliser, the terraces were a mass of celebration. How we would have greeted a winner, which Mark West so nearly supplied, is anyone's guess. But we all know how cruel football can be at times, and cruel it certainly was to see Alty so casually notch a couple of late goals to send us back down the M6 empty-handed once again. It's difficult to describe how it feels for a supporter to see that happen...you feel sorry for the players, the players probably feel sorry for us. Not fair, is it? Unfortunately, it is fair. Although 'morally' we may have deserved a draw at Altrincham from the point of view that our players fought their guts out to score twice, whereas Altrincham, it seemed, did not need that level of commitment to score four. The difference was there for all to see when Timmons chased a long ball towards the edge of our penalty area with a few minutes remaining and simply, almost casually, thumped the ball before Gary Lester could even blink. Cruel maybe, but not unfair and not "unlucky".

Still, at least we did have a stroke of luck against Dagenham when their 'keeper chose to throw the ball straight to Graham Westley on the edge of the penalty area, and then allowed the resulting shot to slip through his legs. A little ironic and very pleasing that such a goalkeeping 'cock-up' should enable us to take three points from 'The Daggers' because some of us still have nightmares about the Runcorn v Dagenham match in May 1985 when a fluke goal by Dagenham 'keeper John Jacobs gave them the undeserved point which sent us down on goal difference. Oh dear, I didn't really want to remind myself of that particular season again. I just wish I could forget 1985....I wish I could be confident that we won't be going through a similar situation again next Spring. After all, we're hardly likely to escape relegation on goal difference this season either. are we?!...Hello, is that the Samaritans?...

DO THEY MEAN US?

During recent weeks it has been noticeable that any comments in print about the Wanderers recent form (or lack of it) have been rather more restrained than some of the comments made by other clubs' supporters and officials.

A number of papers including those covering Enfield & Lincoln have commented on the number of goals we have conceded, while Tommy Docherty in the Altrincham programme glossed over two months without a league win simply saying that we were *"not enjoying the best of fortunes at the moment"*. On the terraces, however, there have been the expected quota of *"Going Down"* chants, while at Boston some of the home supporters commented at half time that they wished they could play against our defence every week.

There has been no escape either by going to watch other teams play. CHAIRBOYS GAS was represented at the Berkhamsted v Barnet FA Cup-tie a few weeks back and after one of the Barnet players had missed an open goal his own fans playfully taunted him singing *"You couldn't score against Wycombe"*. Perhaps the best summing up of the situation came from Kettering boss Alan Buckley before his championship-chasing side played at Loakes Park a few weeks ago. Thanks to an open window in the away dressing room a fair number of supporters heard his pre-match team talk when he stressed to his side the importance of winning that afternoon to close the gap on Barnet, and he finished by saying *"You've got to beat this lot - because everybody else has!"*

The visit to Altrincham provided supporters with a number of talking points, the presence of royalty (*) in the pub next to the ground before the game (some people stood up as a mark of respect), the strange sight of Wycombe taking the lead and the stupid behaviour of some of the local stewards goading visiting fans (has no one told them that they are supposed to help prevent crowd trouble, not start it?). The biggest laugh at Moss Lane was provided by a group of total strangers (who were those scarfed men?), who were really getting behind the Wanderers, but had people in stitches when they claimed that *"We're the pride of Oxfordshire"*.

Back to the subject of local papers and the increased coverage in the BUCKS FREE PRESS, which has been mentioned before in this magazine. The amount of space devoted to The Wanderers affairs appears to have doubled since our spell in the top-flight two seasons ago (I certainly did not expect them to send anyone to cover the game at Altrincham) and this was really brought home when I was given a copy of a Sutton paper covering their match against us and their win over Aldershot in the FA Cup. The Aldershot game, proclaimed by Sutton manager Barrie Williams as the club's best ever result, gets just half a page of coverage (including four photos) while the report of the Wycombe/Sutton game runs to just 134 words. Although you might not agree with some of the things the FREE PRESS has said this season (I'm sure club officials won't), at least they are making the effort again. For what it's worth, I think most of what the BFP has had to say this season has been a reasonable reflection of the views being expressed on the terracing.

Surprise defeats by title contenders KETTERING TOWN and LINCOLN CITY allowed BARNET to regain their place at the top of the Conference. Barnet's only loss of League points during November came in a 1-1 draw at Kettering Town. Kettering lost at KIDDERMINSTER and BATH CITY and at home to ALTRINCHAM while Lincoln dropped two points in a 0-0 home draw with WEYMOUTH and also lost 4-1 at SUTTON.

BARNET added to their long list of signings for the season when they captured defender/midfielder Everton Carr on a free-transfer from BATH CITY. Carr, who started the season with WEYMOUTH, also played one game on loan at AYLESBURY UNITED just four days before making his Barnet debut in their 2-0 victory at CHELTENHAM TOWN. Carr was introduced into that game following an injury to Noel Ashford in the 44th minute. Ashford had to leave the field following a crunching tackle with Cheltenham's Ray Baverstock, described by Manager Barry Fry as "a disgraceful tackle, and the culprit, who was booked, was lucky not to be sent-off".

Ashford, following pain-killing injections for a badly bruised shoulder, was able to play in the top of the table clash at Rockingham Road four days later against KETTERING TOWN and provided a superb cross for Dave Sansom to head in Barnet's 52nd minute equaliser. In the same game tragedy struck in the 73rd minute when following a challenge with Kettering's striker Doug Keast, Barnet's likeable 'keeper Steve Humphries broke his right leg. Left-back Peter Brown took over in goal for the night and Andy Lomas, recently on trial with Newcastle United, will deputise while Humphries recovers.

At the other end of the table, WEALDSTONE, who have won just one game all season, have lost Manager Terry Burton. Burton, who took over from Colin Meldrum in September of this season, resigned following failure to achieve one single victory in his thirteen Conference and Cup matches in charge. Ironically, their only win of the season, a 1-0 home success over Enfield, was achieved when the Club were without a manager. 'The Stones' are currently interviewing possible replacements and former Wycombe boss Alan Gane has been linked with the position that has now been vacated by three managers in the past ten months.

The G M Vauxhall Conference are assured of at least two clubs in the Third Round Proper of the F A Cup on January 9 following the pairing of MAIDSTONE UNITED with KIDDERMINSTER HARRIERS and WELLING UNITED with BATH CITY. In addition LINCOLN CITY, SUTTON UNITED, RUNCORN, MACCLESFIELD TOWN and NORTHWICH VICTORIA all have the chance to play First and Second Division sides in the Third Round Proper if they overcome Football League opposition in the Second Round Proper on December 5.

The competition proper of the F A Trophy opens on Saturday December 19 with a full representation from the GMVC. The north/south regionalised draw has thrown up some interesting ties, including WINDSOR & ETON v BARNET and AYLESBURY UNITED v KETTERING TOWN. Wycombe's clash with CHELTENHAM TOWN is one of only two 'all Conference' clashes in the First Round draw - the other being the Cheshire derby RUNCORN v NORTHWICH VICTORIA. Last season's Trophy winners KIDDERMINSTER HARRIERS take on the current leaders of the Northern Premier League, FRICKLEY ATHLETIC.

SEASON BY SEASON

1947-8

SUMMARY by Steve Maguire.

Looking back at the events at Loakes park forty years ago we find that some things have not changed very much. During the 1947/48 season the Club were forced to print warning notices in the programme after missiles were thrown during a match, there were complaints from supporters about the length of time it took to get back from away matches, while Club Secretary Reggie Boreham stated that there was no truth in rumours which linked the Club with a number of 'star' players of the day.

The travel problems were caused by petrol rationing rather than Motts Coaches. A cut in the ration forced people out of their cars and onto buses, causing problems for fans and players alike. Some supporters had to wait for over three hours for a coach after the F A Cup match at Southall, while full-back George Jackson missed the first twenty minutes of one game because all the buses passing his Wycombe Marsh home were full.

On the pitch the Wanderers were rather more successful in cup competitions than in the League. In the F A Cup a crowd of over 7000 (receipts £300) saw us take revenge on Hayes, who had put us out the previous season, but we eventually went down to a last minute winner at home to Southall.

Late goals were also the order of the day throughout our Amateur Cup run which saw our first ever meeting with northern giants Bishop Auckland. A late penalty miss settled the tie with Walthamstow, with Wycombe 'keeper Norman Holliman still kicking the goalpost to get the mud off his boots when Walthamstow 'scored' from the spot. However, the referee insisted that the kick be re-taken and Avenue's second attempt was blasted over the bar and we went through. In the next round some 50 coachloads of Wycombe fans saw more drama at St Albans when centre-half Vickers, despite an injured shoulder, made the score 2-2 with just moments of normal time left. Peter Birdseye then scored in the last few seconds of extra-time to earn a replay. The following week we again left it late at Loakes Park in the replay, two goals in the last twelve minutes of extra-time putting us through.

Supporters of a nervous disposition were advised to give the Third Round game with Ilford a miss, where once again we came from behind to win. After being two goals down after an hour it was Peter Birdseye to the rescue again with the last goal of his hat-trick coming in the final minute. The team's fighting spirit was shown once again in the Quarter-Final away to Bishop Auckland. 3-nil down at one stage we recovered to 3-2 but a disputed goal to the home side proved too much and we made our exit from the competition.

There was more disappointment in the County Senior Cup when our reign as holders was ended at Elm Park by Chesham United, making it an unhappy Easter for the Club - on Good Friday the Reserves had been beaten in the B & B Intermediate Cup Final by Flackwell Heath in front of 5,534 people.

1947/48 saw the Club run a junior side for the first time while there was another first when Loakes Park staged its first international with 8,600 seeing England's Youth team beat Wales Youth 4-3 on 28th February 1948.

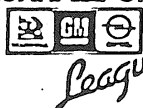
BROMLEY made it to the top of the VOL Premier Division by the end of November following a month that had seen them unbeaten in all competitions. They ended the month with an impressive 4-2 home victory over early pacemakers, FARNBOROUGH TOWN

Bromley, who have also progressed to the Third Round of the AC Delco Cup and to the Second Round of the GMAC Cup, currently head SLOUGH TOWN and WINDSOR & ETON on goal difference and also have four games in hand. Windsor in fact were the surprise leaders of the Premier Division in early November and hit a high when a crowd of 1,219 at Stag Meadow saw 'The Royals' overcome local rivals, Slough, thanks to a goal from David Regis. David Regis, brother of Cyril, joined Windsor this season from Fisher Athletic and has formed a profitable scoring partnership with Selvin Campbell who joined last season from Burnham.

The biggest shock of the month, next to Windsor leading the Premier Division, was the departure of LEYTONSTONE/ILFORD Manager John Still to join MAIDSTONE UNITED in the Conference. Still had been the target of Maidstone's Chairman Jim Thompson for sometime and with the resignation of Maidstone's Assistant Manager Bobby Arber and the move of Team Manager Bill Williams to the position of General Manager the move came into being. Still, who in his two spells with Leytonstone/Ilford brought them considerable success, including the Isthmian Championship in 1982, takes with him to Maidstone his assistant at Green Pond Road George Dudley. The question is who else will Still draw with him to Maidstone? According to Leytonstone/Ilford, who have already applied for a ground grading for the G M Vauxhall Conference, the present squad will remain together in what they believe is their strongest squad in their history. One move they could not prevent from Green Pond Road was the departure of leading scorer Liburd Henry, who joined Watford for a £20,000 fee during November. The former Rainham Town player joined 'The Stones' early last season after previously having trials at Millwall. He had also attracted the attention of Aberdeen and Crystal Palace before signing for Watford.

YEOVIL TOWN are the sole representatives for the VOL in the Second Round of the F A Cup this season. In their 18th appearance in the Second Round they travel to Cambridge United (conquerors of Farnborough Town in Round One). In the preceeding round Yeovil took a replay to beat Beazer Home side Worcester City - a crowd of 3,913 at Huish seeing a single goal from John McGinley settle the tie. Meanwhile in the League Yeovil continue to attract good gates - average around 1,700 - despite a dissapointing opening third of the season. They recently lost their 100% home league record for the season when they drew 0-0 with lowly BARKING - ironically their only away League victory of the season came at Barking on the opening day of the season.

Returning to the F A Cup, CARSHALTON ATHLETIC's F A Cup run came to an explosive close when they lost 3-2 in a delayed First Round tie at WELLING UNITED. Welling's biggest ever gate, 2,237, witnessed an incident packed encounter which saw six players booked and Carshalton defender Curtis Warmington sent-off. Welling's winner came in the last minute from Trevor Booker.

GRAHAM BRESSINGTON

Wycombe Wanderers 1st March 1986 - 21st November 1987

73 appearances - 7 goals - 13 bookings - 2 sendings-off

Graham Bressington came almost unnoticed to Loakes Park in March 1986 - in fact his first game was an 'unofficial' friendly at home to Ruislip Manor where he scored two goals in the Wanderers 7-0 victory. Claimed to be 'KID COURAGE' by the BFP he told Rolf Niven "I can play first team football at Wycombe - it is only a matter of time before that happens". To be exact it was seven days with his first official appearance for Wycombe coming in a 2-2 draw at Frickley.

By the end of the season Bressington had made 12 appearances for Wycombe in the Gola League and also toured with the Club to Greece where he scored twice.

At the start of the 1986/87 season he was 'just another player' - sitting it out regularly on the bench and even coming on to replace Noel Ashford in goal on one occasion against Bognor. But by the new year he was a regular in his midfield position and had adopted the now familiar nickname - 'RAMBO'.

Rambo's only competitive goals for the Wanderers came in a month long spell. He opened his account with a fine individual effort in the 3-0 defeat of Bromley at Loakes on 24 January 1987 and three days later added one to his tally with a piledriver in the 11-1 humiliation of Windsor. The following Saturday he scored the goal that broke the deadlock at St Albans but a week later at Farnborough it was back between the sticks as a last minute replacement for the injured Gary Lester - amazingly enough he kept a clean sheet. His month of scoring was completed when he scored two more vital goals in the League against Windsor at Stag Meadow.

'Bressie' made his 43rd and last appearance of the season during 'that night at Bognor' but an injured foot caused through a 'family illness' (?) meant he missed the joy of playing at Hitchin, Wolverton and Dulwich.

After spending the summer in New Zealand, 'Bressie' made his first appearance of this season at Northwich and immediately made an impact with his battling qualities. Further improvement came in following games, reaching a high point with a commanding performance against Runcorn. After a spell out injured he made his return at Enfield and a week later was impressing Lincoln City at Loakes Park. Never one to mince words, 'Bressie' was sent-off for dissent at Boston and played his last game at Loakes Park against Sutton and for the Club at Altrincham - he will be greatly missed.
