Record-breaking night for Penn in Wanderers cup tie

A NON-LEAGUE club achieved the highest home gate in their history during their Berks & Bucks Cup clash against Wycombe Wanderers.

Penn & Tylers Green, who play at their matches at Elm Road in the village, took on he Chairboys in the second round of the regional competition on October 8.

The fixture had been due to be played on October 7, but with the Wanderers first team in action versus the Fulham U21s in the EFL Trophy, it was agreed that the local cup match would be moved a day later to allow spectators to attend both matches.

In all, exactly 1,237 people crammed inside the stadium as Wycombe spoiled Penn's party with a 2-1 victory.

The club's previous record was around 500 people who went and watched Penn play a 'Showbiz XI' in 1984.

This was matched when the same number of people visited Elm Road in November 2024, for when the women's team played QPR in the Adobe Women's FA Cup first round.

The West London outfit won 3-0. Speaking to the Free Press, club chairman Nigel Miller said: "From a financial standpoint, the fixture is a welcome boost.
"Gate receipts, refreshments, and

"Gate receipts, refreshments, and merchandise sales are all expected to see a significant uptick.

"For grassroots clubs, such windfalls can make a meaningful difference - helping to fund equipment, facilities, and youth development programs.

"Beyond the immediate financial gain, the exposure and goodwill generated by hosting a professional club can open doors to future partnerships and sponsorships. "We have once more been support-

"We have once more been supported by our local sponsors, for which we are truly grateful for their support."

Whilst no first-team players were in action at Elm Road, the B&B tie allowed Wycombe fans to see some

of the club's new academy players in the flesh for the first time.

It was also a new stadium to tick off for any groundhoppers, with the club's chairman offering a deal to any Wanderers fan if they fancy watching a game at the ground.

Penn currently play their league games in the Combined Counties Football League Division One, and last season, finished third, losing to Eversley & Californian in the playoffs.

The chairman continued: "One of the most exciting aspects of the match was the chance to see Wycombe's academy players in action, as this presents a unique challenge and a thrilling prospect.
"Facing high-calibre youth talent

"It also gave fans a glimpse of future stars in the making, adding an extra layer of intrigue to the encounter.

"The influx of visiting supporters, combined with local interest, promises a vibrant atmosphere, and we're also offering all Wycombe fans the chance to gain admission to games at Penn for half price for the remainder of the season.

Duff asks team to be clinical after win over Fulham U21s

WYCOMBE Wanderers head coach Michael Duff wants his side to be 'more clinical' following their 3-1 home victory against the Fulham U21s in the EFL Trophy.

Goals from Donnell Mc-Neilly, Caolan Boyd-Munce and Bradley Fink gave the Chairboys their first victory in the competition this season.

The young Whites did pull one back through a brilliant strike from Farhaan Ali Wahid a minute after Wanderers went three up, with the Adams Park team finishing the game with a staggering 25 shots on goal – 10 of which were on target.

Despite this, only three went into the back of the net, and Duff wants his side to score more goals, as they prepare to face Wigan Athletic in the league this Saturday.

Speaking at full-time, he said: "There were good bits and bad bits, but winning the game is important as we want to get into a rhythm of winning games.

"It's almost as if the game came a bit too easily, as we started to make decisions that we wouldn't make if it were 0.0

"We had patience, physicality, and I thought some players did them a few favours (regarding squad selection) for this weekend.

"But we've had 25 shots at goal but only scored three times – we need to be a lot more clinical."

Duff made 11 changes to the side that drew 2-2 against Barnsley on Saturday, and he was impressed with what we saw

He praised the performance of McNeilly following his first Adams Park goal, which was his second of the season, as well as Fink, who managed to register his first Wanderers strike

On McNeilly, Duff said: "I thought he was very good. "He impacts the game dif-

FORMER Wycombe Wanderers manager Matt Bloomfield has been sacked by Luton Town. The 41-year-old, who spent 22 years with the Chairboys as a player, coach and manager across two spells, was relieved of his duties on October 6, two days after the Hatters lost 2-0 away at high-flying Stevenage. He was appointed by the ex-Premier League outfit in January of this year following Rob Edwards.

mier League outfit in January of this year following Rob Edwards' exit, where he won 12 of his 33 games in charge, drawing seven and losing 14. In the league this season, Luton

In the league this season, Luton had won five, lost five and drawn one of their opening 11 games, following their relegation from the Championship to League One - the same league Wycombe are currently in.

Along with Bloomfield, assistant manager Richard Thomas, first team coach Lee Harrison, and first team analyst Ben Cirne have all left the Kenilworth Road club.

In a brief statement, Luton said: "Matt joined the Hatters in January from Wycombe Wanderers and despite overseeing a run of just two defeats in 11 games leading into the final day of the 2024/25 season, was unable to prevent relegation from the Championship following defeat at West Bromwich Albion.

"Performances and results from the opening 11 matches of the current campaign in League One have fallen below the levels expected, and the Board of Directors has taken the difficult decision to relieve Matt, his assistant Richard Thomas, first team coach Lee Harrison and first team analyst Ben Cirne of their duties.

"The Board wishes to thank Matt, Richard, Lee and Ben for their efforts during a difficult period for the Club and wishes them the very best for their future careers

"Alex Lawless, aided by Paul Benson, Kevin Foley and Kevin Pilkington, will take control of the team for the interim period, starting with Tuesday night's Vertu Trophy trip to Cambridge United.

"With two training weeks ahead of the next league match, the process of appointing a new manager is now underway, which will be led by a committee involving members from the executive team, recruitment, football staff and the board.

"The Club will be making no further comment at this time."

Last season, Bloomfield took Wycombe to the top of the League One table after a terrific start to the campaign, and despite interest from Coventry City, who had fired Mark Robins in November, he opted to remain at Adams Park.

He stayed in South Buckinghamshire until January of this year, leaving with 108 games as manager, 52 of them being wins, 24 ended in a draw and 32 defeats.

Carabao Cup opponents sell out allocation

League Carabao Cup opponents have confirmed they have sold out their allotted ticket allocation for this month's clash at Adams Park.

Fulham will take on the Chairboys in the fourth round of the competition on October 28, with Michael Duff's side reaching this stage of the cup for only the second time in their history.

Marco Silva's team will be backed by around 1,600 travelling fans who will make the relatively short trip from West London to South Buckinghamshire.

The two clubs have played each other 12 times, with Fulham tasting victory on six occasions.

Wycombe have won two of

those matches, with four games ending in draws. Additionally, the last five

Additionally, the last five meetings between the two have come in cup competitions, with the previous three encounters all coming in the League Cup.

Oddly, the away team has been victorious in those games, with Fulham winning twice at Adams Park in August 2015 and August 2017, and Wanderers once at Craven Cottage in September 2006.

Wycombe have also played the Fulham U21s four times in the EFL Trophy since the 2018/19 campaign.

Record signing Westergaard missed game with injury



Wycombe Wanderers' Anders

Michael Duff has provided an update on the club's two record signings in Anders Hagelskjær and Magnus Westergaard.

The duo, who were both signed by the Chairboys in January of this year, have only featured five times between them since the beginning of September.

This is after appearing in 11 games in all competitions during August. Hagelskiær had started the season

as one of the club's first-choice centre-backs, making outings in Wycombe's five opening six league games, as well as playing in the

League Cup victory at Leyton Orient. For Westergaard, the box-to-box midfielder has had an inconsistent start to the season, as he has only completed 90 minutes twice this term, which have both come in cup competitions.

Duff said: "We have picked a similar team for the three league games [Northampton Town, AFC Wimbledon and Barnsley], and we changed the 11 for a cup game [against Wigan

"We have to get to the point where we find a more settled 11 in the right shape, as there are many players at the club.

"We need to find solutions as this is an opportunity for players after two disappointing performances. especially after two disappointing first-half displays [in the 2-1 loss at Wimbledon and in the 2-2 home draw against Barnsley]"

When specifically asked about the two Danes, he said: "Mags didn't play because he is injured, but Anders is

"He has been training with the group."

Hagelskjær joined from Norwegian outfit Molde on January 8 for a fee to be around £500,000 - smashing the club's previous record of £200,000 for Sean Devine from Barnet back in

However, the Danish defender's record did not last long as Westergaard followed suit eight days later, joining from Viborg, in a deal worth nearly £1 million. The duo returned to the frame in Wycombe's win over the Fulham U21s.

The players all want to play, says head coach

MICHAEL Duff wants to 'find a balance that works' as he prepares his Wycombe Wanderers side for a league trip to Wigan Athletic this weekend.

The Chairboys head to the Brick Community Stadium with three wins from their last five games following the 47-year-old's arrival at Adams Park in the middle of Septem-

One of those victories was against the Latics in the League Cup five days after his appointment, and in the three weeks he has been with the club, he has already fielded 28 different players.

He admitted that he is still 'assessing' his squad before he has a concrete starting 11, but admitted that the large squad is a 'good problem' to current-

Speaking ahead of this week-end's trip, he said: "It will be a difficult game, and when you're away from home and where we are in the league, we know it will be difficult.

'We've had a difficult start to the season, and we have got a difficult run of games coming up.

"We will go there [Wigan] and need to have a better firsthalf display compared to the last two games [against AFC Wimbledon and Barnsley], where we can show our qual-

"It's about stitching the two together, as we want to get used to winning.

'We have to be better than what we have been, and we need to get that balance right.'

group stage victory against the Fulham U21s in midweek, which saw the Chairboys have a whopping 25 shots on goal, with 10 being on target.

Duff also admitted that some of those who played against Premier League 2 side could feature this weekend. and that he is conscious of Wycombe's poor form in 2025.

In the 60 competitive first-team games the club have had since New Year's Day, Wanderers have only achieved back-to-back wins on four occasions.

He continued: "The squad selection is a good problem to have and we're trying to get an assessment of where all the players are at physically, mentally and tactically.

"I'll have honest conversations with players and some-times they won't like it, but it's down to them to get themselves in the team.
"My job isn't to pick them;

it's for them to get picked.


"The players all want to play, so they need to show that when they step out onto the pitch.

"We don't want players to show off 30 seconds of brilliance and nothing again for the rest of the game, as there is every part of the game you need to be good at.

"It's a lot easier to be consistent when you're winning, and the club haven't done that enough this calendar year.

"We need to find a balance that works.

EFL Trophy chances alive after win over Fulham U21s

WYCOMBE'S EFL Trophy campaign remains alive after they comfortably beat the Fulham U21s 3-1 at Adams

The Chairboys needed to avoid defeat against the young West London side to have any chance of progressing into the next stage of the competition, following a 2-1 home loss against Colchester United last month.

Michael Duff made 11 changes to the side that drew 2-2 against Barnsley on Saturday lunchtime, with Bradley Fink, Alex Lowry, Anders Hagelskjær and Junior Quitirna being some of the notable names that came back in the frame.

The contest very much belonged to the Chairboys as they started brightly and nearly took the lead on eight minutes, when a header from Hagelskjær kissed the top of the net.

On 24 minutes, they took the lead through a terrific piece of individuality from Donnell McNielly. The on-loan Nottingham Forest man sat down two Fulham defenders before firing home his second goal of the season.
It was then two three minutes later,

when Caolan Boyd-Munce scored his first goal since joining from St Mirren in the summer.

Wanderers didn't break a sweat during a very routine 45 minutes, ending the half with 15 shots at goal compared to Fulham's one.

The second half was the same as the first, with Wycombe looking in control, and they managed to wrap up the contest on 50 minutes.

A long ball over the top by Lowry seemed to be dealt with by Fulham defender Eddy Nsasi, but he slipped at the vital moment, which allowed Fink in, and the Swiss forward managed to score his first goal for Wanderers from an incredibly tight angle.

Farhaan Ali Wahid pulled one back 60 seconds later, but the night belonged to the Chairboys.
